am delighted to be writing my first message as President of Long Beach Day Nursery's Board of Directors. We have been very busy over the past few months. Two new Board committees have been formed recently, and their work has had great

positive impact on our operations. The first is the Program Committee headed by Dr. Georgia Jones. This committee is responsible for working with LBDN's Program Director to develop program goals and objectives. Kathy Berry is chairing the second new committee, Marketing. Working with LBDN's Development and Public Relations Director, this committee is chartered with the development of a marketing plan that will develop strategies for engaging funders, clients and employees. We have a very full year ahead of us!

We are planning a Board Retreat in early November to focus on fundraising and resource development to meet the challenges of maintaining a strong revenue stream in the coming years. Thanks also to Judy Gumbiner, Gloria Deukmejian, Meg Westlund and their committee for organizing and hosting this wonderful event at the Gumbiners' private art gallery.

I have been reflecting on the role of President and on the many individuals who have served in this capacity during our ninety-plus years of operation. The early leaders of the Long Beach Day Nursery were clearly visionary in an era when formal day care facilities were non-existent and the rare working woman most likely left her child with a grandparent or neighbor. Our later leaders were no less visionary as they served to guide the agency through LBDN's continuing growth and service to the children and families of our community. I feel blessed to be walking in the footsteps of such talented volunteers.

Executive Director's Message

In 1999, Long Beach Day Nursery recognized the critical need for facilitating early literacy skills and promoting family involvement in language development. As a result, we created "Ready to Read," (previously known as the Early Literacy Program) which focuses on classroom literacy and language development activities

classroom literacy and language development activities for all our children, ensuring at least two hours of these activities each day.

Children take their first critical steps toward learning to read and write very early in life. Those silly rhyming games you play with your children, as well as those songs you sing over and over again, help your kids to increasingly consolidate information into patterns that allow for automaticity and fluency in reading and writing. So the next time you're singing "The Wheels on the Bus" or reading "Good Night Moon" for the hundredth time in a row, be assured that you are helping your child to become more familiar with letters and words, as well as assisting them to relate pictures to words and vice versa. You are playing a very important role in the development of both their expressive and receptive language.

Our "Ready to Read" curriculum, beginning with even our youngest infants, consists of activities designed to encourage language and literacy development at all age levels. Word and rhyming games are used on a daily basis; dramatic play and story telling are a critical curriculum component to encourage expressive language; child-dictated journals encourage verbal expression and foster association between print and the spoken word. As you can see, "Ready to Read" encompasses many play elements and is fun for your children. Reading readiness is more than just learning the alphabet! I hope some of you had the opportunity to see these activities first-hand at our recent "Sunshine Day" open houses. (For more information regarding "Ready to Read," please see the article on page 6 of this newsletter.)

Take the time to play word games, sing, and read to your children. Take the advice of Albert Einstein, who once said, "If you want your children to be smart – read them fairy tales. If you want them to be real smart, read them more fairy tales."



- Garden supplies: seeds, potting soil, gardening tools, watering cans, plastic pots, insect netting
- "Gently used" children's CDs, cassette tapes, puzzles, toys, balls, dolls and books

- Miscellaneous garage items: Paint brushes, water hoses, flashlights, cooler/ ice chest on wheels, small tent, step stool, wagon
- Kitchen items: Serving trays, pie pans, small pots and pans, pitchers, ladles, sponges, dishwashing wands, plastic kitchen utensils (mixing spoons, spatulas, funnels, measuring cups, etc.), oven mitts, plastic containers, brooms and dustpans, adult-sized aprons
- From the linen closet: Flat full or queen size sheets, bath towels or bath sheets, hand towels, big floor pillows, blankets (especially baby-sized)
- Clothes and accessories of all sizes for dress up and dramatic play: shoes (men's and women's), hats (especially men's), scarves, uniforms (firefighter, construction worker, fast food, police officer, etc.), wigs, empty cosmetic cases, brushes, combs, empty lipsticks, neckties
- "Labels for Education" save labels, UPC codes and lids from Campbell's soups, Franco American, Pepperidge Farm, Swanson Broths, Pace Salsa, Prego Pasta Sauces and V8 Juices.


kind of thing is the norm at LBDN, not the exception, and I thank and bless you all for it."

Ready to Read

One Main Objective, Three Main Components

"Reading is central to learning—in school, in the workplace, and in everyday life."

-The Early Literacy Project, Telus Learning Connection Project Centre

ype in "early literacy" on any Internet search engine and it will return close to a half million entries that include that phrase. Clearly, early literacy and reading readiness is a topic of great concern to many. The growing body of research demonstrates that the "seeds of literacy are planted before children enter school." (The Early Literacy Advisor) Research also shows that children who are not well prepared in these early years may struggle with reading and learning throughout their lives. In some cases, they never catch up.

As children learn, they increasingly consolidate information into patterns that allow for automaticity and fluency in reading and writing. Teaching a child to read involves complex relationships between whole language, phonics, development, natural environment, direct teaching and intervention; a balanced approach is encouraged through "purposeful, functional use and meaningful context within a print-rich environment." (The Early Literacy Project, Telus Learning Connection Project Centre).

Based on this knowledge and research, LBDN has developed "Ready to Read," an integrated and balanced early literacy curriculum, which is implemented at each of our sites with developmentally appropriate activities for all age levels. Beginning with even our youngest infants, at least two hours of early literacy and language development activities are implemented each day.

The three main components of "Ready to Read" include:

Reading Readiness – Activities integrate science, language, arts, math, art, drama, story telling, song time, puzzle play, dramatic play, and other activities that focus not only on language enhancement, but also on development of the children's large and small motor skills. The curriculum emphasizes:

- Phonological Awareness playing word/rhyming games to teach children letters and words;
- Oral Language dramatic reading/story telling to assist children in relating pictures to words and developing expressive and receptive spoken language;
- Print Awareness child-dictating journals (written by teachers) to encourage verbal expression and fostering

- association between the child's spoken word and print; and
- Alphabet Knowledge teaching the alphabet and beginning writing skills.

Each classroom is equipped with age appropriate books, games and materials for the children to read or request to teachers. Thanks in large part to the Rotary Club of Long Beach, new books, games and materials are replenished each year, and each child receives an age-appropriate book as a gift during the holidays.

Teacher Readiness – LBDN's teaching staff takes reading readiness and language development very seriously. Teachers regularly participate in early literacy workshops and programs to obtain the latest training and research in the field. In fact, over 30 teachers participated in the state's intensive 30 hour "Heads Up! Reading" program and in turn facilitated seven parent workshops on reading readiness.

Parent Readiness – Family members play a critical role in a child's language development and reading. Each of our sites has prepared easy-to-use "Literacy Kits" available for take-home use. The kits incorporate weekly activities to involve all family members, thus promoting intergenerational reading activities at home. These kits supplement the classroom libraries and the take-home libraries, which offer materials to parents to check out for home review and use. Parents are encouraged to ask any teacher or staff for how to check-out a kit.

LBDN, Young Horizons, Comprehensive Child Development Meet at

Joint In-Service Training

t this summer's third annual In-Service Training, LBDN teachers and staff were invited to exchange ideas with similar organizations in the community – Young Horizons and Comprehensive Child Development – at the Reef Restaurant overlooking the Long Beach harbor.

The daylong event offered teachers and staff a chance to network with peers and the opportunity to attend a workshop with noted child development expert Lisa Murphy, otherwise known as "The Ooey Gooey Lady," who provided teaching materials and innovative strategies for implementing reading readiness activities in the classroom. According to LBDN Program Director Amy Bigelow, the keynote speaker Sally Jue, an internationally known diversity consultant, offered a wonderful presentation on diversity in the workplace. Other sessions included tips on staying motivated and focused, domestic violence awareness, science curriculum, administering medications, infant & toddler activities, mental health and teacher permit matrix update.

During the event, LBDN released an updated emergency & disaster preparedness manual, presented years of service awards (5+years) and awarded stipends to 22 teachers who have completed 30+ hours of approved professional development. Each of the centers also met individually to discuss agency-specific issues.
